



EASTER SABBATH

AS GOD was constituting Israel in the Sinai wilderness after rescuing them from Egypt in the Exodus and then solidifying that constitution in the Ceremonial Law, He gave to them two kinds of Sabbaths.

There was to be the weekly Sabbath, held on the last day of every week, in which Israel was to cease working and to stop and remember the twofold debt they owed to God, as both their Creator and Redeemer. Then, there were to be annual “Sabbaths,” which were to be yearly festivals in which they were to devote special attention to the union that they had with God.

In Exodus 23 God commands three festivals to be observed – the Feast of Unleavened Bread, the Feast of the Harvest, and the Feast of Ingathering, to which were added the Feast of Trumpets in Numbers 29, the Day of Atonement in Leviticus 23, and the Feast of Purim, which is described in Esther 9.

In these annual celebrations they were to give particular

attention to the different parts of their relationship with God that they remembered each week in the Sabbath.

These sabbatical feasts were intended to be solemn reminders

that all that they had, and all that they were, was to be understood in light of the relationship they

had with God, by virtue of His being their Creator and Redeemer.

In the New Testament it was only the weekly Sabbath which remained, being moved to the first day of the week (the day of Christ’s resurrection) and becoming the Lord’s Day, but essentially functioning in the same way, being for Christians a day of rest, remembrance and worship.

As the Ceremonial Law went away, having fulfilled its function of preparing the way for the coming of Christ and being fulfilled in His coming (Hebrews 8:13), it was only the weekly Sabbath which remained, rooted as it was, not in the Ceremonial Law, but in the very actions of God in the Creation Week.

HOWEVER, over the course of Church History annual Sabbatical feasts reappeared in the life of the Church, in the form of various liturgical calendars.

In the feasts of Christmas, Good Friday, Easter, Ascension, Pentecost, Harvest Festivals, and New Year celebrations the Church began to focus on certain aspects of Christ's life and ministry and their implications for our salvation, and our complete reliance upon God for the sustenance of our lives. In these various festivals, the two main emphases of the weekly Sabbath day were given special promotion that we might remember our place before God.

These feasts, of course, were not mandated by the New Testament scriptures. They are not necessary for obedient Christian living, but these "folk" Sabbath festivals are of great use in fixing our attention on the salvific work of God.

THIS YEAR we will celebrate Easter on April 5th, and we will be celebrating it with our Service of Lessons and Hymns.

This service, like our Service of Lessons and Carols, will be structured around a progression of readings, hymns and special music that will lead us to the climactic focus of the service – specifically, we will read through the Christ's Passion, moving from His betrayal to His arrest, to His trial, to His crucifixion and then seeing His triumphant rise from that grave victorious over sin and over death, establishing His glorious Kingdom in which we dwell by faith.

It will be a wonderful, contemplative service, in which we will be brought back to the very central point of our faith, and we will see vividly the deep, deep love of God for sinners that He would send His only Son to die in our place that we might have eternal life.

Although the service is in April, I am writing this now to encourage you to come, and also to be thinking about who you can invite to this wonderful service of contemplation and celebration.

May the Lord use this Sabbath festival to fix our minds on His glory in Redemption! ☩

- Approved vacation for Rev. Brown as follows: April 6th-13th, Sunday, June 7th, and June 22nd-July 1st.

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
Women's Bible Studies

Skookie, around whom the story hinges, is a Southern lady from Point Clear, Alabama, whose identity is wrapped up in her family history. A crisis occurs when she finds out she isn't who she has believed herself to be. She then begins to think of herself as a "nothingburger," a woman who has done no more than marry, raise children, and keep house. Robbed of her identity, and a year older than she had believed, she seeks to learn more about her birth family, while simultaneously consulting Point Clear's only psychiatrist.

Skookie's search for her real family eventually takes her to Wisconsin, where she learns about her birth mother and her mother's interesting sisters, who are the daughters of a Polish immigrant. Their unforgettable adventures give her inspiration for her own life.

Woven into the fabric of this book is a nearly unknown part of American history—the WASPS (Women Air Force Service Pilots) of World War II. These women, who ferried planes from manufacturers to military bases, went for 35 years without recognition because their records of service were sealed and classified. Combined in this book are a review of this special aspect of our country's history and a charming story of southern culture, with a chuckle on nearly every page. ☺
